

## FOUNTAIN FROM HUMANE ALLIANCE IS ON WAY HERE.

Will Be Placed at Broadway and  
Washington Street When It  
Arrives.

The drinking fountain presented to Buffalo by the National Humane Alliance is on its way here and the work of installing it on the site selected for it at Broadway and Washington street will soon be started. This gift to Buffalo will stand as a monument to the memory of Hermon Lee Ensign, founder of the National Humane Alliance, who died in 1899.

Mr. Ensign was born in Carbondale, Pa., June 30, 1849. At an early age he moved with his parents to Sheffield, Ill. At 15 he was an expert telegrapher. At 20 he determined to enter the ministry, and became a student at Phillips Academy. His health or finances failed and he left school, making his way to Chicago, where he engaged in successive business enterprises, finally turning to journalism and then to advertising, in which latter field he achieved marked success and won a fortune. In 1884 he moved to New York.

From childhood he had been a lover of all domestic animals, and his desire to see them well-treated became more intense with the passing of the years and finally dominated his life. He accordingly founded the National Humane Alliance and to its work devoted his time and fortune. While its work was in its infancy death took Mr. Ensign, but he had foreseen this and by his will devoted his wealth to the work of the alliance, which is administering the large estate he left in promoting the good work he started.

The Humane Alliance has offices at 513 United Charities building, New York City. Its officers are: Harrison Grey Fliske, president; Frederick B. Tilghman, vice-president; Lewis M. Seaver, secretary and treasurer.
