

HANDSOME FOUNTAIN ERECTED IN THE CENTER OF BROADWAY

Stands Near Washington Street and Is for Benefit of Horses and Dogs—Built with Herman Lee Ensign Funds.

SOMETHING like an oasis in the desert, a beautiful drinking fountain for horses and dogs has been erected in the center of Broadway at Washington Street, which is now used as the stamping ground of many moving vans and express carts. Unless these vehicles are ordered to move from their present location, it will be impossible for passing drivers to permit their horses to drink cooling waters in the summer months. With the removal of the standing wagons, the fountain, which is simply but nicely designed, will beautify a spot that heretofore has looked barren except for cobblestones and wagons.

The drinking fountain has been erected at funds left for this purpose by the late Herman Lee Ensign of New York City, a wealthy philanthropist, who was interested in the welfare of all beasts. He created a fund of seven thousand dollars which was to be used for this purpose. Fountains of similar design have been erected in Albany, Syracuse and Binghamton. The fountain stands about seven feet high. The base is a marble block, on which stands a solid marble column. Upon its column stands a huge marble trough, bowl shape. In the center of the bowl is another column, which tapers off to enhance the beauty of the whole fountain. From the upper column spurts the water that fills the bowl for the horses to drink. The water comes from small iron lipheads. At the bottom of the fountain are small drinking bowls for dogs.

Buffalo secured this fountain through the efforts of the local Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The New York Humane Society wrote to the officials of the Buffalo society in regard to the erection of such a fountain, and steps were taken here to secure the attractive addition to Buffalo's drinking fountains for animals. Mayor Adam was communicated with, resulting in the Common Council granting the necessary permission for use of the water mains. The fountain costs approximately \$500.

TREASURY—Mr. Cortelyou of New York.
WAR—Mr. Taft of Ohio.
NAVY—Mr. Metcalf of California.
JUSTICE—Mr. Bonaparte of Maryland.
INTERIOR—Mr. Garfield of Ohio.
POSTOFFICE—Mr. Meyer of Massachusetts.
AGRICULTURE—Mr. Wilson of Iowa.
COMMERCE AND LABOR—Mr. Strauss of New York.

Despite all reports to the contrary, Secretary of Agriculture Wilson is a fixture with the Administration.

If there was ever a wish on the part of any administration leader that Mr. Wilson should retire it has ceased to exist. For the past week or so gossip has been busy with the name of Gifford Pinchot, Chief Forester of the Government, as a probable successor of Secretary Wilson.
